1	14 January – 29 March 2018	Philippines, Mayon Volcano Phreatomagmatic Eruption update as of 29 Mar 2018 adinet.ahacentre.org/reports/view/1043 DSWD <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • PHIVOLCS has downgraded Mayon Volcano status to Alert Level 2, meaning the volcano is at moderate level of unrest. Sudden explosions, lava collapses, pyroclastics density currents can still occur and threaten areas in the upper to middle slopes of Mayon. • A total of 23,786 families / 91,055 people in 61 Barangays of Albay Province are still affected. • A total of 487 families / 1,930 persons are currently in 5 evacuation centers. A decrease of 3,086 persons from previous weeks, with 4 evacuation centers have stopped operations. • A total PHP 480,423,648.95 (USD 9.2 million) worth of assistance has been provided to affected families by DSWD, local government units and NGOs (increased by around PHP 64 million from Week 12).

Regional Summary (Week 13)

- 1) Most of disasters in Week 13 were hydro-meteorological in nature with minor floods, strong wind and landslides in Indonesia, Singapore and Thailand. Thailand Meteorological Department issued a summer storm warning for northeastern and eastern provinces for Week 14.
- 2) In Philippines, Mount Mayon status has been downgraded to Alert Level 2 from 29 March 2018, although its activities still affecting people of Albay Province. Also, a M 4.7 in Eastern Samar occurred on 30 March 2018, with MMI IV reported. No damage reported, according to [NDRRMC](#).
- 3) In Indonesia, monitoring was heightened due to phreatic eruption and release of toxic gas from Mount Dieng in Central Java Province. [BNPB](#) reported no fatalities or loss.
- 4) [ASMC](#) maintains **Alert Level 2**, i.e. exceeding 150 hotspots in 2 consecutive days with dense smoke plumes; dry weather persisting; and prevailing winds blowing towards ASEAN countries. In the northern ASEAN region, with shower activities continued to be observed. Scattered hotspots were detected mainly in Vietnam and Lao PDR. Few hotspots were detected in the southern ASEAN region.
- 5) All disasters occurred in Week 13 were within the capacity of respective ASEAN Member States.
